There is a widespread issue of domestic violence that many members of our school and community suffer from that needs to be addressed. Domestic violence can manifest itself in various ways, such as physical abuse, sexual abuse, financial abuse, and emotional abuse. Domestic violence can occur in many different situations and amongst all social, religious, and cultural groups (Aldridge, 2021). Additionally, "financial instability is one of the greatest reasons why, after gaining freedom, a woman who experiences battering has limited choices and may ultimately acquiesce to her partner's attempts to reconcile" (Conner, 2013). We must take a stand against domestic violence and address financial instability in our community. We are calling on you as a public servant to stand up victims of domestic violence and help them with their plight. The victims need sufficient logistical resources to be able to support themselves and their families to leave their abusers.
